**Sermon Series on Forgiveness** – By the time you read this Presby Press, I shall be well into a sermon series on forgiveness. What a profound subject! It lies at the heart of our faith. The cross that marks us as Christians is a constant reminder of the love of God poured out for us. It proclaims, not only the cost of sin, but also the power of reconciliation. The Apostle Paul reminds us that God not only has forgiven us, reconciling us to himself, but has given us the ministry of reconciliation. For me, that means the power of forgiveness does not stop with my healed heart, as wondrous as that may be. As Christians we are called to heal the hearts of the world, bringing them back into communion with God. Forgiveness, then, becomes not simply a private matter between myself and God. It becomes a way of life, bringing joy from anger and life from brokenness.

Our world is full of amazing stories of forgiveness. Thanks to the technological resources of this congregation, we can share some of them with you in worship. If you would like to read more, check out *The Forgiveness Project* ([www.theforgivenessproject.com](http://www.theforgivenessproject.com)). It offers numerous personal stories of forgiveness that have arisen from the deep struggles of our world, including terrorism, murder, and betrayal. Such deep forgiveness does not come easily. It has to be fought for, prayed for, and struggled for daily. Our world will never be all that God means for it to be until we learn the art of forgiveness. But take heart: we do have a Great Teacher!

**Congregational Meeting: September 18** – The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, September 18 for the purpose of electing officers for classes of 2014, hearing a recommendation about establishing a quorum for congregational meetings, and receiving information about changes in our fiscal year. This congregation traditionally elects ruling elders and deacons for the coming year on the third Sunday of September. You will receive information about this year's nominees in the week's prior to that meeting. Let me take this opportunity to thank this year's Congregational Nominating Committee for their hard and diligent work. They are Ed Krech and Booty Catlin, co-chairs; Jack Arnold, Dick Bushey, Betty DuBose, Pat Harris, Chuck Kellner.

At this meeting, the congregation will also be asked to establish a quorum for congregational meetings. The PC-USA is now operating under a new Form of Government. Its intention is to be **permissive** rather than **prescriptive**. In other words, certain matters that were once prescribed by the Book of Order are now open for each congregation to decide. We need to begin with deciding the minimum number of active members required to conduct the business of our congregation. The Session will bring a recommendation for your approval. You will be hearing more about the new Form of Government in the days ahead as *teaching elders* and *ruling elders* (what we used to call Ministers of Word and Sacrament and elders) advance our own learning curves.

Also at this meeting, your Session will bring you information about a change in our budget year. The Session has voted to change from a calendar year to a July 1 – June 30 fiscal year. Reasons for the change and the process we will use to transition will be shared in an open forum at this congregational meeting. Bring your questions. And we will conclude this meeting with an “open” Open Forum for you to bring any concerns or questions you have in the life of our marvelous family of faith. The meeting will take place in the sanctuary immediately following the 11:00 service of worship.

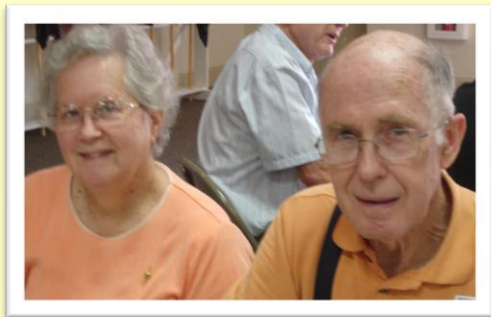

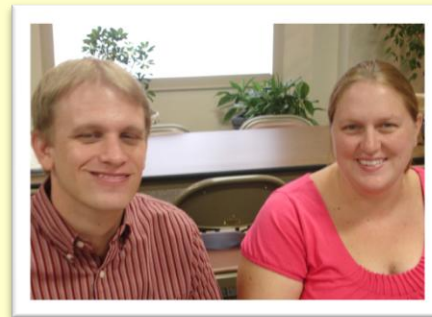

## Bible Chat

*This is one in a series of Bruce Woods' "Bible Chat" articles for the newsletters. This is Bruce's way of offering some of his knowledge, training (to be a lay pastor), and perspectives with the congregation and friends. We thank Bruce for his contributions. While the articles will be reviewed, please note the views and content are not necessarily those of the Session, pastor or this congregation. In Genesis 26: 3-5, there is a remarkable promise made to the nation of Israel. But, from a 21<sup>st</sup> Century Christian perspective, there is a question raised by this passage. Did God give Abraham & his descendents the gifts and blessings mentioned on the basis of good works? Are we to assume that because of obedience the gifts of God will be forthcoming? Is this promise of God unconditional or conditional? In Genesis there are at least five passages cited that seem to imply that Abraham performed the requirements of God and, in return, God offered him the everlasting covenant as a gift for his obedience: 12:1; 17:1, 9-14; 22:16; 26:3-5. Check these out.

The argument for 'conditionality' is less convincing per the stress that the texts make on God actively conferring the covenant on Abraham. In Genesis 15:12-21, Abraham is depicted as a passive party to the covenant which is being formalized, while the Lord appears with the visage of a 'smoking furnace with a blazing torch'. [Your translation may vary.] God is the only active entity here. He not only promises the covenant but puts Himself [not Abraham!] in the position of responsibility to keep the covenant. This is not a peace treaty or international agreement negotiated between sovereigns; this is a promise from God to His children.

How then do we explain the difficult language that seems to require obedience as a condition of maintaining the covenant? God has always offered promises and blessings that precede commands to obey and keep His commands. When Jesus said [see John 14:15, 15:10] things like "If you love me, you will keep my commandments", we know that His love for us is not conditional on or proportional to our obeying Him. God, the promise maker & keeper [to Abraham, Moses, etc. and to His people through the ages], didn't make those promises conditional on our ability to obey Him or work ethic to reduce the sin & rebellion in our lives. We have, since the dreadful day when we chose to disobey God, been like lost sheep. God through the patriarchs & prophets in the OT era and then through His son Jesus has been continually at work to redeem us. The promises He makes are absolute and true. His grace has been offered in infinite abundance to us. And God will be faithful to us until the end of time itself.

Another text, Leviticus 26:44-45, expresses the unconditional nature of God's covenantal grace. Certainly, there is nothing in this text to suggest that the covenant of God [or any promises He's made] are conditional on any human sense of what is 'good behavior' or 'good works' or 'faithful obedience'.

In the next chat we'll take a look at something Jesus said in Matthew 5:22. What He says may not fit with some modern day popular conceptualizations of Jesus. What's your reaction?
